Pet Owner Supply List

1. Food and water bowls
2. Food, cans or dry
3. Treats
4. Collar or harness
5. Leash
6. Identification tags with the owners phone numbers
7. Microchip
8. Pet carrier or metal crate
9. A bed
10. Shampoo
11. Nail Clippers
12. Brush
13. Training pads
14. Toys- balls, rope, chew toys and puzzle toys
15. Plastic pet waste bags



Things to Consider When Adopting

When you adopt a dog, you are getting involved into many things:

- You have to get a groomer or groom your own dog
- You are going to need to exercise or walk your dog everyday
- You are going to have to train your dog different commands
- You will need to buy food, treats, and toys
- You will need to buy a leash, collar, poop bags, and food and water bowls
- You will need to buy a crate if they aren't going to roam around
- You are going to need to pay for medicine, shots, and vet visits

If you have an energetic dog, you will need a big fenced in yard.

If you have a puppy, you will need to potty train them.

If you have an older dog, you need to make sure you are giving them enough love, help, and care.



Why should you adopt from fosters rather than breeders?

- **You help stop cruelty in mass breeding facilities.**

These unfortunate animals are often in intolerable environments, forced to produce litter upon litter, and are destroyed after they become unprofitable assets. Adopting a shelter animal means you don't support such cruel practices.

- **You save a life.**

All animals at our shelter are in need of a second chance. They have been lost, given up or abandoned. They are all unwanted and helpless. You are giving them a new life in a loving home.

- **You help break the cycle of pet overpopulation.**

There are not enough homes for all the animals that are born every year. Adopting from a shelter helps weaken the pet overpopulation cycle. Each year 8 to 12 million dogs, cats, puppies and kittens are euthanized because there are simply not enough homes for them.

Games you can play with dogs

- tug a war
- fetch
- hide and seek the treat
- frisbee
- basketball fetch
- dog safe bubbles
- flirt pole



- train the dog to play fetch and they drop the ball in a bucket

- hot and cold
your voice gets higher when the dog gets closer, your voice gets calmer when the dog gets farther away. You hide a treat for them to find

- wild man
you go crazy, your dog follows you and goes crazy, stop suddenly and your dog sits. Repeat.

Safe foods for Dogs

- Bread {small amounts without raisins}
- Cheese {small to moderate amounts}
- Coconut
- Cashews {small amounts}
- Corn
- Eggs
- Honey
- Milk {small amounts, be cautious}
- Peanut Butter and Peanuts
- Popcorn
- Quinoa
- Salmon, shrimp, Tuna, Turkey, Pork, Fish

NOT Safe foods for Dogs

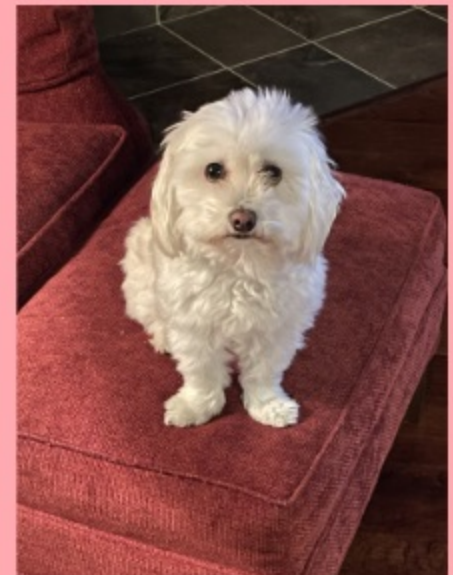
- Chocolate
- Cinnamon
- Garlic
- Ice Cream
- Macadamia nuts
- Avocado
- Cherries
- Grapes/ Raisins
- Tomatoes
- Asparagus
- Mushrooms
- Onions
- Caffeine

What it takes to Foster/Adopt

- Be over 18
- Fill out a form
- Reliable Transportation
- Must have a vet
- Background Check
- Foster: includes food and supplies
- Pay \$400 for adoption

Adoption at Jenni's Rescue Ranch comes with the following:

1. Spayed or Neutered
2. Vaccines
3. Micro-chipped



Peanut Butter Dog Treats

Ingredients

- 2 cups flour preferably whole wheat flour or white whole wheat flour
- 1/2 cup natural peanut butter (Make sure to use peanut butter that does not contain XYLITOL (also called birch sugar))
- 2 eggs
- 1/4 cup water

Instructions

- Preheat the oven to 350 F.
- Combine flour, eggs, and peanut butter in a large bowl to make a thick crumbly dough. Add water, one tablespoon at a time, until you can form the dough into a large ball.
- On a clean floured surface, roll out the dough to about 1/4 inch thick.
- Use cookie cutters or a knife to cut into individual treats. Place the treats on a baking sheet and bake for 15 minutes. Let cool before feeding.

Notes

- You may need slightly more water than stated, depending on the type of flour you use. Whole wheat flour tends to create a drier mix than all-purpose.
- Recipe can be cut in half, or doubled.
- Store tightly covered.
- If treats will not be consumed within a few days, I recommend freezing extras to keep them fresh. Just thaw them at room temp prior to sharing with your pup.
